WORSHIP IN MARCH

Sunday mornings – the heart of our life together!

9:30 a.m. Nursery care begins; First Hour Faith Formation for All Ages 10:30 a.m. Worship in the Sanctuary for All Ages; nursery care continues 11:30 a.m. Coffee and refreshments in our Gathering Room. (The Rev. Anne Swallow Gillis, preaching)

The Season of Lent invites us to focus on the person and teachings of Jesus. Following the Gospel portions of the Revised Common Lectionary through this month, we will consider the question "who is this Jesus?" Each Sunday we will explore Jesus' interactions with a different individual. Each encounter provides a slightly different perspective on Jesus. Varied perspectives can help us better answer this question, "who is this Jesus," for ourselves.

March 5 – First Sunday in Lent, Holy Communion and New Member Welcome #1. Immediately following his baptism in the River Jordan, Jesus retreats to the wilderness and is challenged to his core. In Matthew 4:1-10, Jesus encounters the "the evil one" (sometimes referred to as the "devil") who taunts and tempts him. Jesus is revealed as a resister of evil in its many guises.

March 12 – Second Sunday in Lent and New Member Welcome #2. We leave the Gospel of Matthew and enter the mysterious world of John's Gospel. In John 3:1-17, Jesus has a late-night visit from the Pharisee and scholar Nichodemus and speaks of "being born again." This powerful metaphor of human transformation enables us to know Jesus as a giver of new life.

March 19 – Third Sunday in Lent. In an encounter unusual for its day, Jesus converses at length with a woman drawing water from a well. This passage from John 4:5-42 invites us to know Jesus as provider of "living water." Pastor Anne will be joined by Rev. Philip Rohler in exploring how our church's valuing of inclusivity is "living water" for our wider community. At a Congregational Meeting following the service, the membership will be invited to approve a revised "Open and Affirming" Statement, proclaiming our welcome of and advocacy for the LGBTQ community (see proposed Statement on page 3).

March 26 – Fourth Sunday in Lent (guest preacher). In this John 9:1-41 text, Jesus heals a man blind from birth. What kind of healer is Jesus in our day? Pastor Anne will be on a week of study leave, and the retired UCC pastor, The Rev. Jeff Crews, will preach and lead worship. Rev. Jeff enjoyed a career as an architect before later heading to seminary and pastoring churches in Hawaii and northern California. Pastor Anne and he currently serve together on the Minnesota Conference Committee on Ministry.

From your Interim Pastor

As I shared with those of you able to attend our January Annual Meeting of the Congregation, I will be retiring from full-time pastoral ministry during 2017. I am finding that as each liturgical season cycles around, I am saying to myself: "This is my last Christmas pageant, late night Christmas eve service, Epiphany party around a bonfire in the snow, and now my final Annual Meeting with these dear people! Here I am in the final sessions of my last Confirmation class, my last times to preach this part of the Common Lectionary Cycle. Yikes!" I am filled with both deep gratefulness to be concluding my pastoral ministry with all of you this year, and also sadness that I won't be here with you for many more yearly cycles to come.

As we spiral around to the season of Lent once again, I'm wondering how we might use this time most effectively to engage with God at a deeper level. Unfortunately, Lenten traditions have often been misused, with too much introspection or mindless refraining from some "tid-bit of affluence," as one of my preaching mentors, Fred B. Craddock, used to warn. The forty days before Easter have been a time of self-reflection and repentance throughout church history, but some of us Protestants are wary of too much shaming sin-talk. Is there a better way of preparing ourselves for the transformative possibilities of Easter?

I think a well-observed Lent can help us spread our spiritual wings a bit. Unlike the season of Advent before Christmas, the weeks of Lent are not filled with busy holiday plans. There is a spaciousness in the five weeks, where we can engage some new spiritual practices, learn more about the teachings and persons of Jesus, and discover new ways to serve in Jesus' name.

Your Adult/Intergenerational Ministry Team, as well as the Worship and Outreach Ministry Teams are busy working with me on various themes and programs for this time. Our music staff is exploring ways to deepen our worship experience through different types of music, and I'm planning a sermon series called "Who Is This Jesus?" We're planning Wednesday night Lenten suppers and a host of small group learning times.

Dive in with us, spread your spiritual wings, ponder some questions and see what this Lenten season might bring to you and your life! Prayerfully consider the offerings described in this newsletter, and see where God is calling you to get involved.

"As seekers and servants growing in God's transforming love, Falcon Heights Church, United Church of Christ joins with the 15th General Synod of the UCC in recognizing and affirming persons of any sexual orientation, gender identification, and gender expression as equal recipients of God's love.

We celebrate the proclaimed truth in Galatians 3: 26, 28: "In Christ Jesus we are all children of God, through faith. There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female: for we are all one in Christ Jesus."

We pledge to covenant our four core values of inclusivity, love, community, and spirituality as a congregation of faith to work for full inclusion of all. We commit ourselves to making justice and inclusivity a reality in this congregation and in the world."

FHC TO HOST COMMUNITY MEETINGS ON VALUES AND POLICING

Falcon Heights Church will be the venue for several public conversations that the Falcon Heights Inclusion and Policing Task Force is holding to gather input on building a more inclusive community and developing policing practices that reflect community values. The effort is one of several taking place in the aftermath of the police shooting of Philando Castile last year.

"At each conversation, part of the evening will be spent in a large group and part will be spent in small group circles," the city's newsletter explains. "Circles are guided by restorative values that foster deep, courageous, honest, and self-reflective dialogue."

The next session is from 6:30 to 8:30 p.m. next Thursday, March 2, in the church Gathering Room and meeting rooms. Participants will help to develop options for how the city can live out the community's values in its activities, policies, policies and practices. Future sessions at our church will be April 3, May 5, and a date to be determined in May or June. More information can be found in the city newsletter.
